A few weeks back, I got an email from Dave Stancil that I think is worth sharing with you. As most of you know, Dave is a former pastor of First Baptist Bristol, and he and his wife, Jill, moved back to this area a few months ago. What you may not know is that since Dave and Jill moved to Abingdon, he and I have met for lunch once a month. We have struck up a warm friendship that I have found to be both personally and professionally beneficial. I've enjoyed getting to know him better, and he has graciously allowed me to pick his brain more than a time or two. He's even graciously agreed to preach for me while I'm on vacation on Sunday, July 18. This particular email, though, wasn't about finalizing a meeting time for lunch or worship on July 18 or other information that friends share with one another through email. Rather, it contained a link to an article about S curves. And while I was previously familiar with S-curves from math and science classes, I'd never thought of them in terms of ministry. I found

this article especially informative. As the author of the article notes, "S curves are sneaky. Early on, they look flat, and we think they will never grow. After they reach the tipping point, they look like an exponential curve and people might think they will never stop growing. As they slow down, we think it's the end of an S curve, forgetting a new one might be around the corner. S curves make us miss the forest for the trees."

That can sound a lot like our relationship with God, can't it? We think nothing is happening, and then all the sudden, these huge, illuminating, miraculous type things can happen all at once. And then, they can seemingly stop just as quickly. When that happens, it feels as like things are over. S curves also happen in the life of churches. Things will seemingly be stagnant. It feels like it doesn't matter what we do because nothing seems to change or take flight. But then all of the sudden, things can just take off! God will show up in a mighty way, and we're off to the races. Then things slow down and seemingly come to a stop. And it feels like things are over. What's important for us to remember, however, is that nothing never happens. Something is always going on. God is always at work around us and through us. And the way we get beyond what feels like stagnation spiritually, mentally, numerically, professionally, etc. is to keep our heads down and keep doing the work we believe God is calling us to do.


None of us, myself included, can predict when exponential growth is going to occur. Only God knows that. All we can do is to continue to be faithful and keep doing the work. The events we have planned for this summer, the work being done by the Long Range Planning Team, the activities we have planned for the fall all of them are our attempts to be faithful and to keep doing the work. And that's why I want to encourage you to get involved in them. Many hands make light work, and who knows? Your participation may cause your faith journey to enter into a stage of exponential growth. Your invitation to a friend may cause that growth in his or her life. Both the Spirit and S curves can work in mysterious ways, but people are most likely to experience the blessing and growth that come from them when they're open to it. It's my prayer both for you and for this church that we will keep doing the work, that we will continue to be faithful, that we will continue to be open to the Spirit's leading. Because if we are, we will see what God is doing around us. And we will be motivated; we will be inspired; and whether it be numerically or spiritually or personally, we will grow from that encounter.



<u>Section 6 - Trustees</u>

Section 6 – Trustees

The Board of Trustees are to be nominated and elected, to serve a five-year term, with one member of the board rotating off every year. A Trustee must rotate off one year before accepting a nomination to serve another five-year term.

If a vacancy occurs, the Ministry Team will nominate a new candidate at the earliest scheduled church business meeting. When elected, the nominee will begin service immediately.

The Mission Team is sponsoring a drive-by food donation for the Blessing Box on Sunday, July 11 from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The Team decided that now that it is easier to get out, we could depend more on the congregation to supply the food.
